Blood transfusion can be a life-saving medical treatment and is considered standard of care in the treatment of many medical conditions. Each day the blood services of Australia and New Zealand issue an amazing 2,000 red cells to treat patients.

As a specialist transfusion society we strive to provide independent expertise in transfusion medicine, promote best practice in clinical and laboratory transfusion medicine, and support transfusion-related education and research.

In order to meet our mission statement and support transfusion research, this year we have increased the Research Fund Grant to \$75,000 to allow greater funding of worthwhile projects.

To support transfusion-education for our members, we will shortly be advertising the ANZSBT Scholarship. The scholarship amount of \$12,500 is to help towards the professional development of scientists, nurses, medical staff students and transfusion practitioners by helping members pursue a course of transfusion-related study or research.

For those who have not seen the news section of the webpage, I can now officially announce that ISBT is coming to Brisbane in 2021, the meeting will be held between the 16th and 19th November. This meeting provides a fantastic opportunity for ANZSBT to showcase the tremendous work that is being done across Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific in transfusion medicine and science

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ANZSBT COUNCIL NOMINATION

Clinical Practice Improvement Committee

The CPIC has finalised the updated Guidelines for the Administration of Blood Products, and these should be released soon, responding to feedback from members on the double independent check. The feedback has highlighted a need amongst Australian and New Zealand clinicians for more specific resources explaining how this might look. Members are working on developing compliant approaches at their own institutions and we're hoping to be able to share some of these in the near future.

In the interim, Bloodsafe e-Learning has put together a video explaining the intent of a double independent check, which can be found here:

More broadly, we are also planning to facilitate the sharing of clinical practice improvement projects in transfusion and patient blood management. Currently we are working on the framework, and you shall hear more on this in future.

Jumping straight into this with enthusiasm has been a new member, Alana Delaforce. We welcomed Alana in October and are pleased that she is still able to find time to contribute amongst her schedule. In addition to her role as quality coordinator in transfusion at Brisbane's Mater Hospital, she is also undertaking her PhD examining the barriers and facilitators to implementing PBM.

Transfusion Science Standing Committee

The TSSC has continued with monthly teleconference meetings resulting in the revision of the Guidelines for Transfusion and Immunohaematology Laboratory Practice being in its final stages. However, release of the draft NPAAC Requirements for Transfusion Laboratory Practice for consultation will require review for consistency with this standard. Additionally, issues raised by the Australian Red Cross Blood Service and the National Blood Transfusion Committee require further research and will delay the release. The issues have included storage and transport of blood products; storing other products besides blood products in dedicated blood fridges and freezers; and storing plasma derivatives in fridges such as vaccine fridges.

The committee has commenced review of the Guidelines for Laboratory Assessment of Fetomaternal Haemorrhage (FMH). Issues regarding testing methods are being reviewed and clarified, and the committee is consulting with RANZCOG to determine if our recommendations will have any clinical impact on patient care in the community

The Extended Life Plasma (ELP) review will occur after the FMH. The implementation of ISBT labels will be considered as part of this review. The committee is currently seeking clarification from TGA on a number of concerns.

RCPAQAP Transfusion Discipline News

The Royal College of Pathologists of Australasia Quality Assurance Programs (RCPAQAP) Transfusion has completed another successful year in 2018. Survey summary reports for 2017 for the basic and general transfusion compatibility programs, antibody titration and phenotyping programs were sent out to laboratories. The purpose of these additional reports was to provide peer group comparison to laboratories so that they could review their own individual performance.

The one-day Transfusion Seminar held in 2017 at the Royal College of Pathologists in Sydney was a tremendous success. In 2018, another very successful Transfusion Seminar in Melbourne received extremely positive feedback from attendees. For 2019, RCPAQAP is planning to include a one and half hour symposium at the Blood 2019 meeting in Perth later this year. Planning is in progress and the details of the symposium will be announced in due course.

A survey monkey questionnaire was sent to participants to assess interest in taking part in an ABO titre pilot survey. In 2019, laboratories that have expressed interest will receive pilot survey samples. Transfusion QAP would like to thank the Advisory Committee members and the participating laboratories for their feedback and participation in Transfusion RCPAQAP surveys.

2018 Patient Blood Management International Consensus Conference

The 2018 PBM International Consensus Conference, held in Frankfurt, Germany defined the current status of the PBM evidence base for practice and research purposes. The Scientific Committee established 10 clinical recommendations and 12 research

recommendations for preoperative anaemia, RBC transfusion thresholds for adults, and implementation of PBM programs.

An editorial regarding the importance of patient blood management and the recommendations from the conference were published in the March issue of JAMA.

Patient Blood Management Recommendations From the 2018 Frankfurt Consensus Conference

BloodSafe eLearning Australia

BloodSafe eLearning Australia has released four new, free-to-access, online courses on iron deficiency anaemia.

- IDA: Essentials introductory course including prevalence, diagnosis and management;
- IDA: Paediatrics case-based, application to paediatric practice;
- IDA: Preoperative case-based, application to a preoperative patient; and
- IDA: Heavy Menstrual Bleeding case-based, application to chronic blood loss.

Two more case-based courses will be available midyear: Maternity, and Complex Comorbidities.

International Collaboration for Transfusion Medicine Guidelines

The International Collaboration for Transfusion Medicine Guidelines (ICTMG) was established in 2011 with international transfusion experts as members. The goal of the ICTMG is to create and promote evidencebased clinical guidelines to optimise transfusion medicine. Current guideline topics include: Platelet, FNAIT and Hemoglobinopathies.
